Subject teachers will consult with students and parents to make a recommendation for which paper the candidate should be entered for during Year Grade 10.

This will be based on their achievement on the course so far and it will have to bear in mind the longer term goal of International Baccalaureate Diploma or further education courses. Every effort has been made to make the information here accurate at the time of writing. Cambridge has the right to change its assessment methods and syllabi as well as administrative guidelines therefore some information may be subject to changed.

^{**} In Group 4, we have 2 sub groups. Group 1 does "International Math" in one year. At the end of grade 9, this group can take the IGCSE exam. This class is called the "Accelerated Math". In Grade 10, this group will continue with Additional Math (by the end of two years, the group gets 2 credits). Group 2 does "International Math" for 2 years, and then takes the IGCSE exam, at the end of Grade 10.

English as a Second Language (0510/0511)

Course Description:

IGCSE Second Language English is designed as a two-year course for students who already have a working knowledge of the language, and want to consolidate their understanding in order to progress in their academic or professional career. Cambridge qualifications develop successful students. They not only build understanding and knowledge required for progression, but also learning and thinking skills that help students become independent learners and equip them for life.

Cambridge IGCSE English as a Second Language is accepted by universities and employers as proof of ability to understand and communicate in English. It is aimed at students whose first language is not English, but who use it as a lingua franca or language of study. Successful English as a Second Language candidates have better educational or employment prospects and gain lifelong skills, including:

- better communicative ability in English
- improved ability to understand a range of social registers and styles
- a greater awareness of the nature of language and language-learning skills
- a greater international perspective
- a sound foundation for progression to employment or further study at Levels 2 and 3 including AS and A Level GCE, and Cambridge Pre-U qualifications.

Please note.:

In Syllabus 0510, marks for the Oral component do not contribute to the overall grade candidates receive for the written components. Instead, where candidates perform to an appropriate standard, certificates record separately the achievements of grades 1 (high) to 5 (low) for Speaking.

In Syllabus 0511, marks for the Oral component contribute to 15% of the overall grade and the listening is 15%.

EAL (NON IGCSE SUBJECT) English as an Additional Language

Course Description: EAL courses/In-class support focus specifically on the language and skills required to access mainstream subject areas - History, Geography, Science, and English Literature. A further objective is to ensure that students have some of the language skills required for entry into mainstream English. This is a non-examination subject.

Final Assessment:

This is a non-examination subject. Formative assessment is done by the EAL teachers for the course work. This course is credit earning and is reported as a coursework grade only on the report cards.

French (0520)

Course Description: Cambridge IGCSE French as a foreign language is accepted by universities and employers as proof of linguistic ability and understanding. The course encourages learners to develop lifelong skills, including:

- The ability to use a foreign language as a means of practical communication
- Insight into the culture and civilization of countries where the language is spoken
- A positive attitude towards language learning, towards the speakers of other languages, and towards other cultures and civilizations
- Techniques which can be applied to other areas of learning, such as analysis and memory skills
- a sound foundation for progression to employment or further study.

French at CIS is taught at two levels – lower level for beginners (under 2 years learning French) and higher level for students who have learnt the language for more than 2 years.

Spanish (0530)

Course Description: Spanish Cambridge foreign language IGCSE is accepted by universities and employers as proof of linguistic ability and understanding. The course encourages learners to develop lifelong skills, including:

- The ability to use a foreign language as a means of practical communication
- Insight into the culture and civilization of countries where the language is spoken
- A positive attitude towards language learning, towards the speakers of other languages, and towards other cultures and civilizations
- Techniques which can be applied to other areas of learning, such as analysis and memory skills
- a sound foundation for progression to employment or further study.

Topic Areas:

The syllabus content is organized around five broad Topic areas which provide contexts for the acquisition of vocabulary and the study of grammar and structures. Through the study of these Topic areas, candidates gain insight into target language countries and communities.

The Topic areas are:

- The world around us
- The world of work
- The international world.

Hindi as a Second Language (0549)

Course Description:

Syllabus aims and assessment objectives

The aims set out below describe the general educational purposes of a course in Hindi as a Second Language, and are the same for all candidates.

- 1. develop the ability to use Hindi effectively for the purpose of practical communication.
- 2. form a sound base for the skills required for further study or employment using Hindi as the medium.
- 3. develop an awareness of the nature of language and language-learning skills, along with skills of a more general application.

Topic Areas:

The topics selected relate to the interests and needs of the candidates in using Hindi as a Second Language, e.g. education, the world of work, current affairs, great personality, health and welfare, travel, school affairs. Spiritual, moral, ethical, social, legislative, economic and cultural issues.

Final Assessment: (Exam in March)

Scheme of assessment for all candidates take Papers 1 and 2 and are eligible for the award of grades A* to G. Assessment objectives and their weighting this syllabus assesses Reading, Writing and Listening skill

Paper 1 Reading and Writing Section 1: four exercises – reading, information transfer, note-making and summary writing. Section 2: two exercises – reading and writing. Duration 2 hours weighting is 67%

Paper 2 Listening skill Four exercises – comprehension and true/false. Duration Approx. 35–45 minutes 33%

Paper 2 Structured questions 2 hours 15 minutes Candidates answer one compulsory question, which requires them to interpret and analyse previously unseen data relevant to a real economic situation, and three optional questions from a choice of six. Weighted at 70% of total available marks.

GROUP 4 SUBJECTS International Mathematics code (0607)

Course Description:

This course can be done in one year (Accelerated Maths) or two year. Students doing the accelerated course attend the IGCSE Board examination in grade-9, all others will do so in Grade 10. This course has 3 papers. Only graphic display calculator is allowed for this course. If students complete Accelerated Math in grade-9 then they are eligible to take Additional Math in Grade-10.

Syllabus aims

Cambridge International Mathematics (IGCSE) syllabus is designed as a two- year course for examination at age 16-plus. The aims of this syllabus should enable students to:

- Acquire a foundation of mathematical skills appropriate to further study and continued learning in mathematics;
- 2. Develop a foundation of mathematical skills and apply them to other subjects and to the real world;
- 3. Develop methods of problem solving;
- 4. Interpret mathematical results and understand their significance;
- 5. Develop patience and persistence in solving problems;
- 6. Develop a positive attitude towards mathematics which encourages enjoyment, fosters confidence.

- 1. Algebra (Expansion and Factorisation, Equations and Inequalities, Formulae and Simultaneous equations, Algebraic fractions).
- 2. Sets
- 3. Lines, Angles and Polygons
- 4. Graphs charts and tables
- 5. Exponents and Surds 6.Pythagoras theorem 7.Mesnsuration

Course Description: Cambridge IGCSE is internationally recognized by schools, universities and employers as equivalent to UK GCSE. The Cambridge IGCSE Information and Communication Technology syllabus encourages students to develop lifelong skills including:

- the ability to understand and implement new and emerging technologies within a business environment
- how to analyse, design, implement, test and evaluate Information and Communication Technology (ICT) systems

IGCSE Drama (0411)

Course Description:

Cambridge IGCSE Drama is accepted by universities and employers as proof of knowledge and understanding of both the theory and practical application of drama.

Through practical and theoretical study, the Cambridge IGCSE Drama syllabus encourages students to understand and enjoy drama by: developing their performance skills, both individually and in groups; understanding the role of actor, director and designer in creating a piece of theatre; considering ways in which ideas and feelings can be communicated to an audience; discovering the performance possibilities of plays and other dramatic stimuli; devising dramatic material of their own.

Component 1 Written examination - 2 hours 30 minutes-40% of total grade

The questions on this paper relate to pre-release material which is sent to Centres in advance of the examination. This material consists of three stimuli and an extended extract from a play (or an abridged version of an entire play). Candidates devise a piece of drama based on one of the three stimuli and study the extract from the play.

The questions on the paper will require candidates to have engaged with the pre-release material from the perspective of actor, director and designer.

Component 2 Coursework - 60% of total grade Candidates submit three pieces of practical work.

- One individual piece (3–5 minutes):
 one performance of an extract from a play.
- Two group pieces (maximum 15 minutes each):

 one performance of an extract from a play and one original devised piece.

IGCSE Music (0410)

Course Description:

Cambridge IGCSE Music is accepted by universities and employers as proof of musical skills, knowledge and understanding. This syllabus offers students the opportunity to develop their own practical musical skills through performing and composing.
