Expectations from parents of High School and Pre-University Sections

Being a parent of a teenager is perhaps the most complex of tasks that adults have to undertake. At Aditi we expect parents to be *hands-on*. This means setting clear boundaries for your child, being present for parent-teacher conferences, ensuring that your child does not miss classes, community service programmes or outward bound trips *for* family functions, extended family holidays, weddings or concerts. Proactive, positive parenting which is supportive of the school's philosophy is expected from Aditi parents. Students in High School and Pre-University Sections are still minors and are not always capable of making rational decisions. They are not adult income earners. Hence, parents need to ensure that all teenage events are properly supervised. The school has open discussions regarding various issues facing today's teenagers and has regularly mailed parents regarding safety concerns at parties and concerts. Careful reading of all communication and advisories from the school, acting on them and sharing the same with students is also expected.

Balanced Parenting

"Parental involvement has a long and rich history of being studied. Decades of studies, many of them by Diana Baumrind, a clinical and developmental psychologist at the University of California, Berkeley, have found that 'the optimal parent is one who is involved and responsive, who sets high expectations but respects her child's autonomy. These "authoritative parents" appear to hit the sweet spot of parental involvement and generally raise children who do better academically, psychologically and socially than children whose parents are either permissive or less involved, or controlling and more involved. Parents also have to be clear about their own values. Children watch us closely". (Madeline Levine)

Expectations from students

Aditi offers a wide range of options in academic and co-curricular activities. Students are expected to show commitment to their basket of choices. Aditi is unequivocally committed to academic excellence. This is a school where all students including "nerds" are celebrated. We want students who are excited about learning and scholarship, who delight in books, ideas and the world around them. Those who do not consider academics important and who are unwilling to put in the concerted effort are requested not to apply here. We expect our students to be mindful of the fact that their parents are giving them this educational opportunity, leading to a culture of respect and appreciation and disavowal of any sense of entitlement. This includes not condoning behavior like indifference, ungratefulness, constantly asking for accommodations to be made and asking for recommendations and transcripts without due notice. We do not appreciate hubris in any form, not just in students but in all members of the community.

Aditi teachers expect students to be passionately and deeply engaged with the learning process. This means active participation in class, since teachers will use diverse teaching methods. Students need to make the most of the varied learning opportunities that are offered. They need to build academic stamina through regular study and being actively involved in academic enhancing programmes like professional forums. Student-led initiatives are encouraged.

Students who do not intend to fully avail of all the academic and other opportunities that the school has to offer will not thrive here.

Disciplinary Action

A student will invite appropriate (as decided by the school) disciplinary action for the following:

- Any conduct that disrupts or is likely to disrupt teaching or the administration of the institution.
- Insensitive, intolerant or discriminatory behaviour, such as racist, communal or sexist remarks, which reflect social or religious prejudice.
- Use or attempted use of unauthorised or unfair means in tests and examinations or plagiarism in connection with assignments, projects and homework.
- Deliberate, reckless or negligent conduct causing damage to property or persons. This includes improper use of furniture, school buildings and electrical appliances.
- Rudeness or insolence towards any member of the teaching, administrative or support staff.
- Failure to comply with any of the school's regulations, including those concerning the use of laboratories, library and other facilities.
- Evidence of the use of tobacco, alcohol or drugs. Possession will be deemed as evidence of use.
- Bullying, ragging and other forms of humiliation.
- The use of physical violence.
- The use of inappropriate language.
- Non-compliance with the uniform and/or dress code.
- Repeated absenteeism or tardiness.

The purpose of disciplinary measures is didactic not punitive; it is to guide children in decency and thoughtfulness. Appropriate and thoughtful conduct, like so many other competencies, is perfected through practice.

SUBJECT SELECTION FOR AICE

The Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) is an international pre-university curriculum and examination system, administered by the Cambridge International Examinations (CIE). AICE is a group certificate, awarded on the basis of a broad and balanced curriculum. Under the new AICE scheme, courses can be taken at the Advanced (A) or Advanced Subsidiary (AS) Levels. Courses taken at the A level contribute 2 credits and those taken at the AS Levels contribute 1 credit to the AICE group award. To receive the AICE diploma, a student must have a total of 7 credits with at least one subject from each subject group, and AS Global Perspectives.

First Year:

In May / June 2020 he/she will take FOUR / FIVE AS Level Examinations in the chosen subjects. Environmental Management is taught only at the AS Level.

Second Year:

In May / June 2021 he/she will take:

- a) Three or Four A Levels (University admissions require THREE A Levels.)
- b) Cluster 6 subjects
- c) AS English Language
- d) Any AS Levels he/she wants to improve upon

SUBJECT SELECTION FOR ISC

The Indian School Certificate Examination is an examination after a two year course of studies beyond the ICSE (Std. 10) or its equivalent through the medium of English. The ISC curriculum offers a wide variety of subject choices and is recognised worldwide. Not all combinations are however viable in meeting the requirement of professional and career goals leading to university courses or careers and subject choices must be made with due deliberation. Students become eligible for the ISC certificate awarded by the council, if they meet the standard in four or more subjects, which includes English at one and the same examination.

- 1. Students who have done examinations other than the ICSE will be given only provisional entry until the *Council for the Indian School Certificate Examinations* grants them eligibility certificates to enroll for the ISC course.
- 2. Entry to Std. 11 is subject to confirmation only after the statement of results in the qualifying examination, conduct certificate and transfer certificate have been submitted.
- 3. Students wishing to take Hindustani Music must satisfy the Creative Arts Department that they have an aptitude for and a keen interest in Indian Classical music. It will be timetabled according to teacher availability.
- 4. All students wishing to do Art (AICE and ISC) will need to take an aptitude test in Art. In addition, those wishing to do AICE Art should have taken Art as a subject in the qualifying examination in Std. 10. Art students will have additional Art classes two Saturdays (morning) every month over the next two years.
- 5. Subjects will be offered only if a viable number of students apply.

Physical Education, Life Skills and Community Service are a compulsory part of the Pre-University Programme.
