One passage is an informational text about the fox and the other is the Aesop fable, The Fox and the Grapes. Both passages are written at an early to mid second grade level. The passages are written on a half sheet of paper so that students can read the passage and glue into their interactive notebooks. Then students can complete the interactive notebook activities for each passage. Each passage has THREE activities.

## The Crafty Fox (Nonfiction)

- Answer questions about an informational text
- Identifying main idea and two key details
- Finding two points to support a statement by the author


## The Fox and the Grapes (Fiction)

- Identifying Story Elements (a puzzle)
- Identifying nouns and verbs in the text
- Writing a summary using the "Somebody, Wanted, But, SO, Finally" strategy

A few math pages are also included that are fox themed.

- Place Value (two and three digit)
- Adding with base ten blocks (with and without regrouping)
- Relating multiplication and division

4.) Store the puzzle pieces inside a bag for students to grab when they have completed the sheet. You may want to store these in a separate location from the passage and recording sheet so students do not see the answers.
